#### Triathlon in Linz

With the Pyeongchang Olympics over, the season for summer sports has come! Austria is generally not very adept at summer sports at competitions like the Olympics, but summer sports are popular.

They are also thriving in "the Steel City" Linz, which is otherwise famous for its industry and culture. Every year, in the warm season there are numerous sport events for the people of Linz.

One of them is the "Oberbank Linz Donau Marathon" held in the city center on April 15<sup>th</sup>. "Oberbank" is the name of the event's main sponsor. This year, more than 20,000 people participated in the different events such as the marathon, the half marathon, the relay race or the kids' marathon.

Another event is the Linz Triathlon in June. It is held in Steyregg, a small city next to Linz. It is also the home of Mr. Niklas Salm-Reifferscheidt, a descendant of Viscount Shuzo Aoki. The Triathlon starts with swimming in Pleschinger Lake followed by a bicycle race and a long-distance run.

Nasushiobara, too, hosts a triathlon every year. The Student Triathlon Championship takes place at the Toda Balancing Reservoir. This year it will be on June 24<sup>th</sup>. The city is registered as host town for Austrian athletes for the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and is hoping to


welcome the triathletes for a training camp. Actually, one male and three female Austrian athletes registered the ITU World Triathlon

#### Past exchange activities:

In September 2017, a delegation from Nasushiobara attended a dinner party in Steyregg castle in a suburb of Linz. I was asked by the owner of the castle, the Earl of Salm-Reifferscheidt, to perform as a welcome-surprise for the guests and got to meet the visitors from Nasushiobara at this opportunity. This February, when returning to Japan for a short while, I was kindly allowed to visit Nasushiobara's City Hall and talk to the Mayor, the President of the City Council and other members of the City Hall as well as representatives of the Nasushiobara International Association. Breakfast on Mother's Day, Ronniger Family

On the second Sunday of May, Mother's Day, children get up early in Austria. They make breakfast or brunch for their mothers. There are not only the regular bread and coffee, but special treats like pancakes or an array of jams or cheese. These are placed on a festively set table or in some families, served in bed. Elementary school children give presents or cards they made in class. They give their mother her favorite flowers and present poems they have learned by heart. While in Austria red carnations are not as prevalent on Mother's Day as in Japan, the essence is the same: you show your love and gratitude.

By the way, Father's Day is on the second Sunday in June. You also give cards or presents and spend the day with your father.



#### Handmade ☆ Easter Decoration

Wash a white chicken egg and use a pin to punch two holes of ca. 3 mm on the top and bottom of the egg. Blow into the top hole to blow out the white and yolk. Once the eggshell is empty, rinse the inside of the egg with water and dry.

Decorate the eggshell with paint or permanent markers. Once it has dried, pull a thread through the two holes and fasten it with knots. Hang it on an Easter branch.
